Course Purpose and Objectives	The course of Legal Methodology is the branch of Legal Science, which pertains to defining and systematising methods, that is, appropriate ways of discerning the subject of investigation. Accordingly, legal methodology is a scientific discipline dealing with methods of discerning law and legal phenomena. Consequently, the course focuses on the methodological justification of the legal suppositions. Firstly, the course approaches the subject from a philosophical point of view, i.e. what makes a legal argument just, what is the nature of legal language, what is legal reasoning etc. Secondly, the course examines issues of method of legal reasoning: the nature of legal interpretation, its classical methods, the ways of substantive reasoning, the gaps and the contradictions of the legal order. In addition, the module analyses the features of the summary of the arguments and their juxtaposition with previous research or existing knowledge.

Linguistic articulation and regulatory content of the legislation. Gaps and contradictions in the law. The law as a science. Law and language. General theory of the rules of law. Covering gaps and judicial shaping of the law.
