Course Purpose	The research work of the student must be published in at least two international refereed conferences or journals. A student satisfies this requirement with either the publication of the paper or the notification of acceptance. Furthermore, a student is required to present at least one of the two papers at a conference. Students are also encouraged to present their research work during poster sessions organized in conjunction with workshops or conferences In the second study year, every student must prepare a scholarly article, appropriate for publishing in an international journal for scholarly practitioners. The article is, in principle, prepared based on the doctoral research. Due to long publishing lead times, study requirements are fulfilled by the submission of the article and not by its actual publishing. The purpose of this course is to give doctoral students practice in crafting manuscripts that are potentially publishable in scholarly journals. The course is targeted primarily at track B and C doctoral students in the business disciplines, e.g., management, marketing, and accounting. The course reflects the instructor's belief that most social science doctoral students receive little formal training in the craft of writing publishable papers, and that they can benefit from such exposure. Given the pressures to publish in refereed journals that doctoral students will face, as well as the difficulty of getting informal scholarly input from colleagues, a course such as this can be helpful. In particular, in European universities, students and professors are under increasing constraint to publish in English-language journals, which are the orientation point for this course.
