	Students will be encouraged to prepare for each lecture and to approach critically suggested topics. Particular attention will be given to the debate on topical issues, where the actions of International Organisations will be critically analyzed.				
	At the same time, it will seek to prepare students for their participation in Model United Nations simulations, which are implemented and organized by top Universities around the world. Separate preparation will be dedicated to student participation in the FREDMUN (Frederick Model United Nations), organized by the University of Frederick's Department of Law, with the official support of the UN and under the auspices of the President of the Republic of Cyprus and cultural events of Cyprus. Finally, the pursuit of more quality and interactive teaching of the course is the delivery of separate lectures by personalities on the international scene, such as diplomats, ethnologists and members of international organizations.
