| Course Purpose and Objectives | This course aims to provide an introduction to the theoretical and practical aspects of TV & video production. Students study video technologies, basic equipment operation, video composition, basic lighting, and visual storytelling. Fundamental aesthetic principles of digital video production are introduced along with the roles of director, cinematographer, and other creative personnel, so as the function of journalists in front and behind the camera. Specially designed shooting exercises in the classroom, teach the basic techniques of video production in order to achieve its desired effect on the audience. Lectures also include the early stage of the production process in TV & Video and focus on the development of original ideas into full visual projects through the actual design of the production process. | | | | | | |
| Learning Outcomes | By the end of the Course, students are expected to: Acknowledge the different kinds of television programmes and talk about the different ways of presenting them. Understand the specialities and possibilities of the medium television. Analyse with critical intention the current television programmes in the Cypriot television and localise their positive and negative aspects. Get to know the steps of television production and be able to describe the ideal circumstances for the creation of such programs. Develop skills in the video production process and build a vocabulary and conceptual foundation that will prepare them for more advanced projects. Identify the interdependence of the roles of production staff and equipment, and to practice the effective mixing of these elements in actual video production. Examine the essentials of a successful video production, and explore the effect various techniques have on the audience. Utilize basic editing techniques for video production and prepare movies for distribution via disk or the web. Produce creative short video projects individually or as a part of a team from inception to finish through Pre-production planning, Production & Post-Production. Teaching Methodology

Lectures, demonstrations and screenings together with detailed critical analysis at each stage engage students in the practice and disciplines of video production. Lectures address the theory of video production and are supported by practical demonstrations in which the information imparted is put into practice. Screenings are used to critically analyze student projects and to provide examples of good practice. This process is supported by individual student research through directed and independent learning. Students are asked to work in groups to produce group and individual projects. Each project is then critically analyzed in a group discussion and screening. Lecture notes and presentations are available through the web for students to use in combination with the textbooks.

The taught part of the course is delivered to the students by means of lectures, conducted with the help of live presentations within the audiovisual studio. During these laboratory sessions, students develop functional techniques concerning television production and manage to produce and edit completed projects.
