Objectives	<p>General purpose of the thesis:</p> <p>The investigation and critical evaluation of specific legal issues, with emphasis on the comparative study of applicable law.</p> <p>More specific objectives:</p> <p>Theoretical analysis and dogmatic approach of the basic concepts and principles of the legal issue under consideration, in the context of the law of new technologies at European and Cypriot or Greek level.</p> <p>Comparative investigation of the legislative regulations and jurisprudential tendencies in different jurisdictions, with the aim of highlighting the convergences and divergences.</p> <p>Highlighting and critically evaluating issues of application of the law in practice, through selected case law of courts.</p> <p>Assess the effectiveness of existing legal frameworks and propose possible improvements, based on lessons learned from benchmarking.</p> <p>Investigate how the principles of Cypriot or Greek law are affected by European law and the case law of the Court of Justice of the European Union.</p> <p>Draw conclusions on the appropriateness, adequacy and effectiveness of existing legal arrangements, especially in light of modern social and economic needs.</p> <p>Formulation of policy proposals (lege ferenda) with a view to enhancing legal certainty, the protection of rights or the efficiency of justice.</p> <p>The preparation of a master's thesis in the field of law represents a pivotal moment in the academic and professional career of every student. This demanding work offers the unique opportunity to delve deeper into specific legal issues and contribute to the debate that is taking shape around them. It is not just a matter of composing a large text, but of a process that involves the systematic study of the relevant legislation, the analysis of case law and the investigation of theoretical opinions, with the aim of developing critical thinking and drawing original conclusions.</p> <p>One of the biggest advantages of the master's thesis is that it allows the student to work independently, developing their research interests on a specialized topic that fascinates them. Through this process, a deeper understanding of the subject is acquired, while at the same time the ability</p>				

	<p>to synthesize different sources: legislation, case-law developments and interdisciplinary approaches is cultivated. Legal research requires methodicality and attention to detail, as every provision and every court decision can have a significant impact on the conclusions to be drawn. At the same time, the research process substantially enhances the skills of organization and time management. The successful completion of a dissertation requires a systematic distribution of responsibilities, targeted literature search, and constant feedback through discussions with the supervising professor. The gathering, elaboration and evaluation of legal sources create the basis for the formulation of in-depth positions and proposals. Consequently, the student is not limited to a simple set of rules, but develops the ability to form a critical and well-founded opinion, while enriching the theoretical background of legal science.</p> <p>In addition, the preparation of the master's thesis cultivates important research virtues, such as analytical thinking and clear scientific expression. Text formatting, proper use of footnotes, and respect for citation rules are an integral part of academic ethics. All these aspects ensure that the produced work can stand with credibility and validity in the scientific community. In the end, the completion of the thesis and its presentation in front of a committee or at a scientific conference offer the student the joy of creation, as well as the opportunity to discuss and defend his ideas, forming a complete scientific identity.</p> <p>Finally, the practical value of a master's thesis is equally important. The specialization that the student acquires in a specific branch of law in the context of the relationship between law and technology, can be translated into a strong advantage in the labor market, creating employment prospects or further academic development (doctoral studies). Deepening in a legal field allows not only the development of theoretical knowledge, but also a better understanding of the issues that arise in practice, thus contributing to the substantial upgrade of legal science and justice in general. In short, the postgraduate thesis is an invaluable educational and research process, which molds the student into a well-rounded legal scientist, capable of producing primary knowledge and providing creative solutions to contemporary legal problems.</p>
