Learning Outcomes	<p>Students completing the course in Administrative Law are able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Recognise disputes in public law and distinguish them from those under private law. - Identify the place of administrative law in public law and name the categories of administrative courts. - Recognise the sources of Administrative Law and its origins and point out the importance of the existence of general principles of administrative law and the basic principles of administrative action. - Analyse the concept of administrative act, distinguishing non-administrative acts and name the categories of administrative acts. - Explain the concepts of public administration and bodies, public service, public legal entities. - Identify cases of complex administrative action and omission of due legal action. - Describe the characteristics that govern the manner in which the administrative act is produced. - Notice the existence of legislative authorization to issue an administrative act. - Specify the rules governing the legal establishment, composition and operation, as well as the competence of the administrative bodies and the responsibility arising from their action. - Separate public and private contracts and name their characteristics. - Introduce the organisation of public administration and identify the responsibilities of self-governed entities. - Solve practical problems with the implementation of the relevant legislation.
