Course Purpose	The course provides students with opportunities for developing their own research questions and methodological designs. During this course, students develop their own research questions and design the correct methodology to address them. They apply the knowledge gained during their studies to a real situation, by answering questions, providing solutions and explaining phenomena related to the shipping industry. Students investigate a contemporary maritime topic in depth and outline the methodological rationale of their research inquiry. They then submit the introduction, literature review and proposed methodology on their chosen topic, in compliance with the academic project standards of the University.						
Learning Outcomes:	 Formulate specific research questions and /or hypotheses within the above context. Critically review secondary data and draft a literature review. Critically evaluate, compare and contrast different qualitative research methodologies and decide which one should be applied to various research topics of theoretical and conceptual relevance to their programme of study. Methodology Students who have successfully completed the elective module ARRW 120, research methods, are exempted from these sessions.

	Students will then prepare a project report with the following components:				
	 Explanation of the rationale of the research. The research issues, aims and objectives. State the research questions and / or research hypotheses. Prepare a literature review on the area of research, outlining the current state of knowledge of the chosen topic. Fully apply the set Referencing System. Clearly outline the chosen methodology and fully justify its choice 				
	During this time, a topic and supervisor are allocated to each student. Details of the exact procedure are found in the ATPR415 Departmental Project Guidelines. The Deadline for final submission is the last day of the semester classes, as mentioned in these guidelines.				
	Students will be advised about the requirements of the course by the assigned supervisor, the project guidelines and the lecture notes provided in the e-learning platform. Until the final completion of the project, the project Supervisor will be available to provide feedback and guidance on the progress of the project.
