Course Purpose
and Objectives

The objectives of the Civil Procedure Law Module are:

- To learn, understand and critically examine the rules (comprising both the common law principles and the legislative provisions) which provide the legal framework of Civil Procedure Rules and Law in the areas covered by the syllabus (as indicated above)
- To learn, understand and critically examine the considerations of policy which underlie Civil Procedure Law in the areas covered by the Law syllabus (as indicated above)
- To consider the objectives of Civil Procedure as they relate to the areas of Civil Procedure Law covered by the syllabus, with particular reference to its theoretical underpinning, as well as the philosophies and the various conceptions of justice apparent within this area of Law, i.e. those which provide fundamental concepts and/or preliminary and/or foreground and/or background assumptions
- To consider the common law areas of Civil Procedure together with the relevant statutory duties
- To satisfy the Qualifying Law Degree requirements as to Civil Procedure Law

Course Purpose and Objectives	<p>The Civil Procedure in a way constitutes the "executive" part of civil law. That is, is the complement of the substantive part of civil law, which states and explains the manner in which a civil dispute will proceed in court. Having completed much of the substantive civil law, students will now enter the stage of procedural handling of a civil dispute and more specifically will study which court will try a particular lawsuit, where the lawsuit concerned should be registered, which will be the subject, through what stages of hearing (or not) procedure a civil case passes through, what are the consequences of a court judgment, or how a court decision is executed or appealed, etc.</p>			
Learning Outcomes	<p>At the end of the lectures in the course of Civil Procedure, students are expected:</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">To now have a complete picture regarding how a civil cases is handled, that is to say that a case e.g. tort is "transferred" and "handled" in the courtrooms.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">To fully understand the basics of jurisdiction and be able to respond to complex practical questions regarding the structure of the civil proceedings.</p>
