Course Purpose and Objectives	<p>Due to the large volume of material, the module of Criminal Law is divided into two courses. While General Criminal Law is taught in the 3rd semester to introduce the students to the general concepts and principles of criminal law, the second part (Special Criminal Law) is taught in the fourth semester of studies, devoted to the study of specific categories of crimes such as: Criminal offences against an individual, including premeditated murder and homicide, as well as duties that relate to maintenance of life and health, attacks and criminal offences against personal freedom, criminal offences against property, including theft, unlawful entering, burglary, false pretences, bounced cheques, receiving stolen goods and fraud in general.</p>				
Learning Outcomes	<p>This course pursues four complementary goals:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>-to provide to the students a knowledge on criminal offences (incriminations), intended to supplement the basic training in criminal law;</li> <li>- to lead the students to understand the processes of definition of the incriminations and the main issues related to their implementation;</li> <li>- to familiarize the students with the basic principles which frame the production of the incriminations;</li> <li>- to develop the critical attitude of the students, in order to lead them to analyse in an autonomous way the questions of the values, the purposes and the effectiveness linked to the production of the incriminations and</li> </ul>				

	<p>their implementation. These assets should make the students able to understand the context of a changing criminal law, which develops more and more in relation with external references as well to the discipline as to the national territory.</p>

Teaching Methodology	<p>The course will be given in the form of three-hour lessons spring semester. Teaching consists of theoretical courses, enriched by case law as well as by the daily practice of the teacher. The active participation of the students will be encouraged on the basis of previous readings (judgments, press articles, doctrine), which will be the subject of developments during the lecture sessions.
