Course Purpose and Objectives	<p>The field of the course of Interrogation is the investigation, collection, examination and interpretation of evidence concerning the commission of the crime, the disclosure of the identity of the perpetrator, with the aim of combating crime through its procedural repressive mechanism.</p> <p>Specifically, during the teaching of the course, the following basic themes are examined:</p> <p>The Objects, Evolution, Theoretical Foundations of Forensics,</p> <p>The organisation of the interrogation (form, bodies, purpose of the interrogation), Verifying the identity of the accused,</p> <p>The gathering of evidence (crime scene, evidence, court case law, means of execution, expert opinion, witnesses, defendant),</p> <p>The Witnesses, and the accused.</p>
